




Activities for Nursery week beginning 20.4.20.

Watch Easter Story Powerpoint to remind us of the Easter Story.



When Jesus came alive on Easter Sunday everyone was so happy they shouted 'Alleluia' because they were so happy! Perhaps an adult could write the word for you in big letters, and you could decorate the word in any way you can - perhaps with felt pens, foil, sequins etc. You can learn 'Praise Ye The Lord Hallelujah' song on Listener Kids (You Tube). If you have a printer an adult could print off an Easter basket and you could cut out and colour the eggs in to put inside. (see attachment) How many Easter eggs can you fit into the baskets?

Literacy



Our story is 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' by Eric Carle. (see You Tube animated film). Can you remember how the caterpillar grew into a beautiful butterfly? Can you remember what food the caterpillar ate? Perhaps you could make your own caterpillar using marshmallows, and then eat it afterwards! Mmmm- delicious!

Ingredients:


- 2 Tbs. Sweetened condensed milk
- 2 Small bowls
- Red and green food coloring
- Large Marshmallows
- Skewers
- Paint brush
- Crushed brown cookies (optional)

Instructions:

1. Mix one tbs. sweetened condensed milk with food coloring for each colour (plain milk is too runny.)
2. Poke about 8 marshmallows onto the skewer.
3. Paint marshmallows with the coloured milk. Let the caterpillar sit for a while until the milk is dry and not sticky anymore.




The Hungry Caterpillar also ate lots of fruit which is very good for our bodies to help us grow big, strong, and healthy, as well as the caterpillar's body. Can you make a healthy snack using fruit and other healthy food?



See if you can do the Home Challenge sheet below. Try to write some of the letters in the name of your favourite fruit, and think of a sentence to say about how the fruit tastes. Ask an adult to write the sentence for you.

The Very Hungry Caterpillar Home Learning Challenge



The Very Hungry Caterpillar loves to eat lots of different foods. What is your favourite food? Draw a picture of your favourite food and write a sentence to tell us about it.

Try some of the different fruits mentioned in the story. Which one is your favourite? You could try some apples, pears, strawberries, oranges, plums or watermelon. You could also try some other fruits – what other fruit might The Very Hungry Caterpillar like to eat?

The Very Hungry Caterpillar eats 2 pears and 3 plums. How many pieces of fruit did he eat altogether? You could use your fingers or draw a picture to help you.

Draw or paint a picture of a caterpillar or a butterfly. What colours do you need? What different parts do you need to draw? Talk to an adult about your picture.

Phonics: Please keep practising writing your name. If you go on 'Phonicsplay' Red Level, you can practise blending sounds learned s a t p i n m d, and learn new sounds o and r. You might see your old friend 'The Gingerbread Man'. Ask an adult to show you how to write these letters. See if you can write these letters yourself and make some words to read.
